She is active in the Society and takes part in all the undertakings.


Szlojme [Szlama] Białystoker¹

Aged twenty, he was mobilised into the Polish army. After several months, he fled to Germany where, until 1939, he lived in the city of Köln.

With great effort, he managed to escape from Hitler's bandits and, following a long and painful path of wandering, he arrived in Tangier, Morocco.

After difficult experiences and torments, in 1944, he managed to arrive in Canada and settled in Montreal.
