The Pilcer Rebbe ztz"l

Although our Teacher, *Rebbe* Pinches Menachem *ztz"I*, came to Częstochowa from Wieruszów, we called him "*The Pilcer Rebbe*", after his first rabbinical post in Pilica (Kielce *gubernia* [Province]). The *Rebbe* was a *tzadik* of the age, an extraordinarily assiduous studier, whose mouth literally never stopped uttering words of Torah. I, personally, often saw that, on his way to the *mikvah*¹ on Friday, he took with him a *Mishna* or another book, which he studied right up to his immersion.

Followers from all corners of Poland came to him every *Shabbes*. They would flood the Częstochowa streets, wearing their *shtreimels* and silken caftans. Those who prayed with the *Rebbe* had the special pleasure of hearing the fine prayer-leaders Reb Mendel Froman [and] his son Reb Jukel, as well as Reb Mordche Wajnsztok and his choir.

The Częstochowa Jews were proud that such a great *tzadik* lived there. In times of trouble, they went to the *Rebbe*, where they always found a comforting word and good advice on private affairs.

The *Rebbe* passed away in Częstochowa, on *Shabbes*, 10th Kislev 5681 [21st November 1920], at dusk. The death caused great bereavement and tears, not only in town, but also throughout Poland. Hundreds of *Chassidim*, Rabbis and *Rebbes*, came to the funeral, with the *Gerer Rebbe* and many of his followers at the head.

There was a quarrel regarding the burial site. Pilica demanded that he be buried in Pilica and Częstochowa argued that he had died in Częstochowa. A rabbinical court was appointed, which ruled that he be buried in Częstochowa.

In accordance with his will, the *Rebbe* was immersed in the Old *Mikvah*. *Chassidim* heroically went into the ice-cold water, where they immersed the great deceased one.

[Also] in accordance with his will, his tomb was not covered with any roof.

Every *yuhrzeit*, thousands of *Chassidim* would come to Częstochowa and made merry and prayed at his tomb, disregarding the frost of the month of Kislev.

The Rabbi of Pabianice, Reb Mendele Alter z"l, the Gerer Rebbe's brother, who had been one of the [Pilica] Rebbe's great followers, also came for every yuhrzeit.

The grave and tombstone remained undamaged to the last day, which was considered a miracle from heaven.

His son, the Rabbi of Wieruszów, was appointed as his successor (of whom a grandson of his writes separately in "Sefer Częstochowa").
